Dear Fellow Members,

Last year our Visalia-Sequoia Branch gave away \$37,500 to promote educational opportunities in Tulare County. Most of that money was \$25,000 given in COS scholarships. With \$11,050 we sponsored 13 girls at Tech Trek, a science and math camp at Fresno State, and \$1,100 went to Expanding Horizons which gives young women a chance to spend a day at COS. We aren't just about money, but it does give us the opportunity to improve lives and impact our community.

On a national level, AAUW gave out \$4.5 million in fellowships and grants. "AAUW started providing monetary support at a time when institutions blatantly discriminated against women. In 1888 the prevailing thought was that educating women would negatively affect their health," said AAUW Executive Director and CEO Linda Halliman. "But our founding leaders knew that education was a gateway to a better life for women and their families. That work still inspires our work today."

It is good to keep AAUW's goals in mind as we start our new year.

Assistance Service Dogs perform many tasks to help disabled people lead independent lives. When fully trained, the dogs perform over 90 skills in response to verbal commands. Participants train their dogs to perform tasks such as:

-Switch lights on and off

-Open and Close Doors

-Open the refrigerator, bring back a drink

-Open and unload clothes from a dryer

-Help undress

-Pick up and retrieve dropped items

With these commands, dogs can fill a wide variety of human needs. In addition to physically aiding the client, our dogs provide companionship, support, and comfort 24/7.

- -Responsibility
- -Respect
- -Compassion
- -Leadership
- -Patience
