#### — January 21, we mark 100th Anniversary of 19th Amendment — Joint meeting with League of Women Voters

Before the 19th Amendment, life for females in the United States was very different. Did you know that women could not serve on juries (which used to be summoned from voter rosters) or testify in court (as they were considered legally "incompetent")? Married women couldn't sign contracts, either—which made things like arranging conference venues for suffrage conventions doubly difficult!

Author **Angelica Shirley Carpenter** brings all of this to life, through her newest book, **Born Criminal: Matilda Joslyn Gage, Radical Suffragist.** She will help us commemorate the centennial of suffrage, Tuesday, **January 21**, 2020, at a joint meeting of AAUW and the League of Women Voters of Tulare County.

As the founding curator of the Arne Nixon Center for the Study of Children's Literature at California State University, Fresno, Carpenter was making an in-depth study of *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz,* when she discovered that the mother-in-law of author L. Frank Baum had been a leading suffragist. In fact, Gage inspired the strong American heroine, Dorothy, at the center of this beloved story. But why had Carpenter never heard of Matilda Gage? This question led her to peek behind the curtain.

This luncheon, \$20, will be at the Marriott Hotel. Books will be available for purchase and signing by the author. (There will be an opportunity drawing for a signed copy of the book at our Holiday Tea!)

**Coffee and California Concerns** had another great meeting on November 18, 2019. The discussion was based off of the book *Just Mercy* by Brian Stephenson, and lead by Michael Cross, a criminal defense attorney, who has been practicing in Tulare County for around 35 years. Michael drew from the part of *Just Mercy* that concerned false convictions that put people on death row and explained his theory on how this happens. He used 5 examples of cases from his practice in Tulare County to make his point. He spoke for an hour and a half, and most attendees said that they wanted a follow-up session. There were so many questions left unanswered. It was really an interesting meeting.
