#### **OUR LAST GENERAL MEETING - OCTOBER 20, 2020**

As we continue celebrating the centennial of the 19th Amendment, **Amy Shuklian**—the highest ranking female elected official in our county—spoke to a joint meeting of AAUW and the League of Women Voters of Tulare County on October 20, 2020, on the topic, "State of the County."

She started by stating, "The most pressing issues facing Tulare County right now are:

- 1. COVID
- 2. COVID
- 3. COVID



Shuklian quipped that her favorite color used to be purple, but with our county stubbornly stuck in the State's COVID Purple Zone, it no longer is. Tulare County has a 7-day positivity rate average of 10%. This really exposes the health equity divide. In order to get into the Red Zone (where in-door restaurant dining can resume at 25% capacity, and gyms can reopen at 10% capacity, etc.), new cases per 100,000 needs to be less than 7 and we are at 8.9. Currently the population of Tulare County is 480,000. She reported that Porterville "has really stepped up to the plate," and has had the county's most effective COVID response.

Sheriff Mike Boudreaux, after getting started by announcing in July that he will not enforce the mask mandate or other state COVID laws, has tried to correct that by ensuring that his department is always seen wearing masks. The Sheriff's department has 700 sworn deputies. Shuklian points out that the Sheriff is an elected official—not an employee of the Tulare County Board of Supervisors—and therefor not accountable to the Board.

Turning to the thorny issue of homelessness, Shuklian talked about recent County efforts. Healthy Harvest is a program implemented by the state to rent hotel rooms to separate farmworkers that may get sick, especially from COVID. The State of California has provided our County \$5.2 million for Project Homekey.

A similar sounding Project Roomkey is a program to lease hotel rooms to house the homeless and isolate our vulnerable populations. Tulare County has housed over 200 homeless. With the funds, the County was able to purchase Tagus Ranch. Kaweah Management has given a 10-year master lease. It is an effort to provide Permanent Supportive Housing. Tulare County is looking at different programs as solutions for the homeless in Visalia, such as 40 Prado in San Luis Obispo, Utah's Housing First, and Salt and Light from Austin.

Shuklian says. "Right now our County's financial situation is very

good." Tulare County passed a \$1.5 Billion dollar Budget. They have earmarked \$2 million from reserves for any deficits from the economic fallout of uh

the pandemic, leaving \$30 million in reserves. The money is primarily from property tax, which has benefitted from more development. They have also instituted a hiring freeze and eliminated vacant positions.

Tulare County has received \$48 million dollars in COVID relief, through the CARES Act. With that money, they initiated a small business grant program for \$5,000. It is being implemented through the Workforce Investment Board. So for they have issued 1,100 grants. Also with the money, they started an eviction protection program that provides rental, mortgage and utility assistance.


# We Need Your Help
