This summer the virtual statewide camps will be back! The AAUW state board of directors, after a great deal of thoughtful discussion, made the decision that our Tech Trek program will always include a state-wide virtual camp option with a standardized curriculum. In other words, the board endorsed having a single type of virtual camp instead of versions at each site. The board felt the advantages of a standardized virtual camp are consistency of the camp experience, more efficient use of resources, more manageable volunteer requirements, a unified presence for donors, and avoiding unnecessary duplication of effort. Also, our beloved in person camp may still be happening. Fresno State has said an on-site camp can be held though understandably they have not committed to any dates yet.

All five of our Visalia Unified middle schools' 7th grade math and science teachers as well as the principals have just been notified of these developments. We lost a member of our AAUW family...



Ann celebrated her 90th birthday just last month. She was a delight, and is already missed.

Ann's family will be having a graveside service (so it will be outdoors) at the Visalia Cemetery, on Saturday., February 12, at 10:30am. Arrangements are being handled by Miller Funeral Home. The family is planning a light lunch to follow the service, and will announce that at the service. They welcome Ann's friends.
