Did you hear the rumors? Our fall book sale is in peril? Canceled? Is this the end of over fifty years of funds from our FAMOUS Visalia-Sequoia AAUW book sale? Well, it's been an agonizing two weeks of uncertainty, but we finally have our sale planned. It's short notice, so read the information below and be ready to help.

#### HISTORY

Our AAUW book sale began in 1965 in Margo Tressler's backyard. It has grown over the past 57 years into a major community event and the lifeblood of our educational support of C.O.S. scholars, Tech Trek, and Expanding Your Horizons. After it became too much for backyards, it continued in the Visalia Mall until the mall decided in 1993 to no longer host nonprofit organi-

> zations. Then we found our home in the Sequoia Mall, which has provided our venue, tables, skirts, tablecloths, and security for almost 20 years. We are greatly indebted to the mall owners, most recently Paynter Realty, and mall manager, Diane Sherrill, for their incredible support of our mission.

#### NOW WHAT?

The owners of Sequoia Mall have planned projects to change the facility. The manager, Diane, was unable to confirm our original October dates, but was hoping we could work something out. We had a nervous waiting

period, but good news finally came. With her help, we were able to secure new dates before the projects begin. It means a bit of a scramble for us to catch up, but we're determined to make it work.

#### **Other Changes?**

Inflation, inflation. Yes, our prices are going back up to the levels of 2014-2016. One of our goals is to offer thousands of books to our community at an affordable price. But our main goal is to fund our educational programs, thus the increase in some prices:

#### Hardbound books: \$3

Trade paperbacks: \$2 (larger sized)

Mass Market paperbacks: \$1 (smaller sized)


