Travelling Troupers has been a fun interest group in the past for Visalia AAUW members, and we are trying to resurrect it this year. Our first idea for a trip in early December is to San Francisco for a visit to the DeYoung exhibition of King Ramses. Our idea is to go up by train (9:34 from Hanford arriving in San Francisco at 2:50- cost one way \$31 senior rate,., returning the next day on the afternoon train). The trip could either be Thursday-Friday Dec. 1 and 2nd, or the next week on Wednesday Dec.7 -8. Senior rates for the exhibit are \$32 for seniors. Local Voter Information Forum

On October 11, AAUW collaborated with the League of Women Voters, Visalia Times Delta, and other partners to sponsor a voter information forum. It began with a focus on each of the 7 Propositions which included the purpose of the proposition, supporters and opponents, and financial contributions to support or oppose it. A brief Q/A session was held after each so participants could get clarifications.

That was followed by a discussion of Measure C to expand the COS University Center. The evening wrapped up with a demonstration of Voters Edge California - sponsored by LWV California and Maplight. It provides in-depth ballot information including the money behind participating candidates and propositions. https://votersedge.org/ca

AAUW CA Public Policy

AB 92 Co-sponsored by AAUW CA Governor Newsom vetoed AB 92 in a letter that included these remarks;

"The author's advocacy

for California's working families is commendable. Like the author, expanding access to high quality early learning and care programs for babies and toddlers is a priority of my Administration. That's why the 2022 Budget Act included significant investments in preschool and childcare including family fee waivers for the 2022-23 fiscal year, an income threshold increases for the State preschool program from 85 percent to 100 percent of state median income, and funding to allow providers to stay open even if enrollment is down due to COVID-19."

AAUW CA Public Policy Chair Recaps a Successful Year

I'm excited to announce that 25 or our 36 bills for this year are now law – a 70% success rate! Of our six high-priority bills, five have become law. Here is a quick summary:

9 signed by Governor

Equal Access to Education bills

6 signed by Governor

7 signed by Governor

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
