

- During the residential camp at Fresno State, which will be in June, the girls will live in a college dorm, attend a daily STEM class, perform hands-on activities, participate in one or more field trips, and interact with women STEM role models. The girls will get a glimpse of what college dorm life is like.
- Girls who attend the virtual camp participate on-line in similar classes and hands-on activities (materials are provided for them) and are exposed to a host of STEM role models in the online environment, both near-peer and adult females, all from the comfort of their own home.
