After screening Lee Terkelsen's gorgeously edited documentary, "Big Trees—Big Impact," we got some important business accomplished at our Annual Meeting, on April 20. A wonderful slate of Officers was elected (see adjacent box), thanks to the diligence of the Nominating Committee, Cathy Lovell, Chair, and Jean Moritz. The Branch Budget for 2023-24, shepherded by Treasurer **Donna** Nottingham and Financial Director Susan Franciskovich, was passed. And the membership also approved a proposal to increase our annual dues to \$125. These actions bode well for the coming year.

Horobetz finishing up as Chair, interviewed applicants ahead of the campus awards event on May 4. Susan Cunningham provided a lot of valuable assistance, along with Committee members Phyllis Matteson and Liz Kiaska

Jeanne Evans is managing our Tech Trek program to prepare candidates for the June camp at Fresno State. And Lori Olvera-Clarkson oversaw our support of Expanding Your Horizons last fall.

As you all know, these are funded by our Book Sales. Sandy Parmelly, Susan Cunningham and their team of Book Sorters pulled off two successful Sales despite unusually difficult circumstances. And 65(!) of you volunteered to work shifts at the Veterans Memorial Building. ensuring our educational programs continue to be funded. Public Policy Chair Terry Cornelius made sure we cosponsored two voter education fora (with partners League of Women Voters, Visalia Times-Delta and others) in the fall; and participated in both Lobby Day and **GovTrek** in the spring. **Communications** Director Ally Babcock has kept busy: launching our new Branch Facebook account, tweaking the website, and creating a Master Calendar for our activities—all while making sure this newsletter gets to you each month. Our Program Committee

(Sherri Bentley, Susan Mathews and Jan Johnson) has provided us with a wonderful variety of excellent, informative, engaging speakers month after month. An array of high-quality programs enhanced our theme of "Lifting Local Literacy." It's good to see so many attending, and we'd like to see more of you! Parliamentarian Nancy Adalian led a thorough review of our Policies and Procedures. It's not the most exciting task, but having a solid, up-to-date handbook ensures our organization runs smoothly.

The Honored Member Commit-

From finances to legislation to AAUW Fund allocations, the all-day event had plenty of variety and was a wealth of information. (Fun fact: Did you know that the Fund


members dressed to the nines, and reported on the year's activities like movie reviews! Speech Trek finalists gave "performances," and the winner's name was pulled from an




State Public Policy Chair Kathi Harper [left] presents former
